

STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT APPROACH

• Reminder

- The most impacted communities are often the least meaningfully engaged in decision-making
- Without engagement, we cannot invest or expand investments
- Goals for Stakeholder Engagement:
 - Diversify means of communication and engagement (responsive to preferences of our partners)
 - Don't wait until the end to engage! Engage at all key project activities
 - Conduct interviews and focus groups
 - Create an environment where all partners are able to provide open feedback to GBEP.


