## Equity Strategy Goals

- To expand partnerships and funding to **under-resourced communities (URCs) and under-supported communities around the Galveston Bay area.**
- GBEP is setting a numeric target of investing **at least 40% of EPA BIL funds in projects with service areas, including identified priority communities and projects that adjacently benefit these communities.**

<b>2.
