Equity Strategy Goals

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- To expand partnerships and funding to **under-resourced communities (URCs) and under-supported communities around the Galveston Bay area.**
- GBEP is setting a numeric target of investing **at least 40% of EPA BIL funds in projects that serve these areas. This includes:**
 - Projects that **directly** benefit these communities
 - Projects that **indirectly** benefit these communities

1. Expand Diverse Partnerships

1. Expand diverse partnerships	Each subcommittee should attempt to establish new partnerships annually to diversify who GBEP partners with and funds. This includes inviting new individuals and organizations to the subcommittee meetings and expanding who is aware of GBEP's funding opportunities.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Consider annual audits of current partners and a landscape scan of potential partnerships.• Consider leveraging current partners to identify new ones.• Consider attending community events around Houston that are directly or indirectly linked to environmental work (and GBEP priorities).• Consider partnering with community-based and led organizations• Consider partnering with local Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Hispanic-Serving Institutions (HSIs) and Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs)<ul style="list-style-type: none">◦ Texas Southern University (TSU)◦ University of Houston-Downtown (UHD)• Consider partnering with local Indigenous Environmental Groups:<ul style="list-style-type: none">◦ Karankawa Kadla◦ Indigenous Peoples of the Coastal Bend

2. Engage in equitable outreach and selection practices

2.Engage in equitable outreach and selection practices	Each subcommittee should be transparent about how projects are selected for funding and work to standardize selection practices, when possible, to ensure equity.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Consider barriers facing potential partners who want to receive funding but have been unsuccessful.• Consider how the selection process may privilege certain organization <i>types</i> over others.• Consider documenting the selection process, including the timeline for communicating selection and publishing it on GBEP's website to increase accessibility to potential funding recipients.

3. Establish inclusive stakeholder engagement practices

3.Establish inclusive stakeholder engagement practices	Each subcommittee should encourage opportunities for project leaders to connect and network and look for opportunities to connect with communities in the surrounding areas.	<ul style="list-style-type: none">● Consider creating networking events (Both virtual and in-person) for project leaders and subcommittee members.● Consider how GBEP can be more involved with the communities in the Galveston Bay area (with or without current GBEP-funded projects).● Consider engaging local schools and universities (under-resourced, HBCUs, MRIs) that do not have environmental projects or clubs.

5. Tracking Benefits	Each subcommittee should use Tables 3 and 4 of the Equity Strategy to track benefits of each project to URCs	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Consider requiring funded projects to submit the filled-out Table 4 annually (can create a form for them to submit via Microsoft Forms, Google Forms or a platform GBEP already uses).• Consider subcommittee members taking on the responsibility of filling Table 4 out collaboratively with partners or as a subcommittee.• Consider tracking, which projects directly or indirectly benefit URCs (use Table 3 as a template).
