Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan (CCMP) Update: Estuary Resilience Action Plan (ERAP) and Equity Strategy

Erin Kinney gave an update of the appendices that will be added to the end of the Galveston Bay Plan. The beginning of these appendices will include an introduction and executive summary describing the process of discussions with the Galveston Bay Council and the GBEP subcommittees about threats to Galveston Bay in the next 10 years. Changes in the CCMP based on incorporated feedback will be listed along with the page numbers of where they can be found throughout the CCMP. Highlights of the ERAP and Equity Strategy will be created to provide brief summaries for both documents. Dr. Kinney walked the subcommittee through an example on how stakeholders can incorporate the ERAP with the CCMP to highlight how their project proposals can benefit Galveston Bay. Moriah Brewer, GBEP's equity consultant, explained the actions of the Equity Strategy and how they impact and align with the PPE Subcommittee's work. Ms. Brewer walked the subcommittee through the Equity Strategy Guidance Document, which breaks down each action outlined in the strategy with clear definitions, along with guidance and examples of implementation for each action. Ms. Brewer pointed out resources available in the guidance document to support stakeholders in meeting Equity Strategy goals.

Feedback was requested for the presentations on incorporating the ERAP and Equity Strategy by December 18. HARC and Ms. Brewer will draft appendices for GBEP's approval then make them available for subcommittees to review until September 1, 2025. Afterwards, HARC will finalize the appendices and complete the project by February 28, 2026.

Witness Series

Kristi Rangel presented on the annual Witness Series, which centers around artists of color whose works focus on nature. Ms. Rangel explained that the concept of the Witness Series is to uplift communities with under-utilized and under-resourced green spaces. The series is community driven and provides participatory art experiences, where partners and attendees collaborate in a community experience as equals instead of a transactional and hierarchical experience. Ms. Rangel highlighted the history of E.R. and Ann Taylor Park in the Sunnyside neighborhood as the catalyst for the Witness Series to uplift hidden green spaces and cultural histories around Houston, particularly in under-resourced communities. Ms. Rangel shared the format and successes of the Witness Series over its first three years from starting without any funding to being able to commission 35 BIPOC artists. The attendance of over 2000 people has led to collaborations between community members, conservation organizations, artists, libraries, and museums.

PPE Subcommittee Bylaws Discussion

Zoe Gapayao asked the subcommittee to evaluate potential changes to the PPE Bylaws based on changes to operating procedures since the past update. The original bylaws were distributed via email prior to the meeting and hard copies were provided for those attending the meeting inperson. Changes addressed were related to formatting and clarification on voting/ranking actions within the PPE subcommittee. The subcommittee agreed on what constitutes a "member organization" and attendance requirements for voting/ranking eligibility. An appendix that outlines member organizations and attendance records for the PPE Subcommittee will be added to the bylaws. The updated PPE Bylaws were distributed following the meeting to allow for additional comments and suggestions.

Microplastics in the Galveston Bay Watershed

Jenny Oakley presented on UHCL's project in partnership with the Turtle Island Restoration Network (TIRN) on microplastics in the Galveston Bay Watershed. Dr. Oakley outlined the study objectives, which included classroom education, student citizen science sampling, water and sediment sampling, and public outreach. Dr. Oakley went further in-depth about water and sediment sampling of 12 sites in 2022 to evaluate microplastic densities for surface water and sediment samples in Galveston Bay. Microplastics were observed in every sample collected. It is estimated that there are over 20.4 trillion pieces of microplastics in the top 0.3 meters of water in Galveston Bay at any one time.
