Introduction

Our Vision: Healthy communities with clean air every day, for everyone.

Our Mission: To reduce the public health impacts from air pollution through applied research, education, and advocacy.

Our Theory of Change



Research

Inform the narrative through participatory research, modelling, policy analysis, and planning

Education

Build community knowledge and power through the diffusion of information

Advocacy

Create pathways for impacted residents to engage in decision-making

Community Air Monitoring Program (CAMP)

Components

- Stationary monitor networks in nine focus communities: Galena Park/Jacinto City, Kashmere Gardens, Pasadena, Near Northside, East Houston/Settegast, Cloverleaf, Deer Park, Channelview and Baytown.
- Combination of locations: residential homes, community centers, municipal buildings, etc.
- Community residents are recruited and trained to serve as Air Ambassadors who give air quality presentations and more.
- Mobile monitoring events (“Sampling the City”)
- Supplemental monitors placed throughout the region based on community need/concern
- Direct and indirect support to other community networks (Fort Bend Houston, Port Arthur and Houston region.)



Outline of CAMP Program

- Meet with the community.
- Community mapping session.
- Recruit monitor host and install them.
- Hire air ambassadors from the community.
- Educate the community on their network and how to use it.
- Gather data for a year.
- Have a community meeting to share the results.
- Create a community action plan.
- Continue the program and implement the action plan.



Air Monitor Network uses and advantages

- The air monitors are located in the neighborhoods.
- Educate the community how their network can be used.
- Residents can make decisions using the air monitors on going outdoors or dealing with health issues.
- Residents have been using our data to submit complaints and for lawsuits they are involved against industry.
- Have community meeting in each neighborhood to share the results of the data gathered for the one year period.

Getting the community involved:

- Are hired from the communities they work and receive an hourly wage.
- They go through a training which includes topics such as pollution, health effects, how air monitors work and tools they can use to teach their communities about their networks.
- They go back into their communities to teach and inform their communities about our program.
- They help us install, maintain the air monitoring network and more.

Sampling the City



- Bike ride organized in CAMP communities and surrounding areas.
- Bike riders wear small air monitors and take readings as they travel.
- Kid bike ride is also organized so the whole family can be involved.
- The readings are then analyzed and shared back with the community.
- The community gets air quality data, learn bike safety, exercise and have fun.



Petrochemical facilities release toxic air pollution that can harm your health, increasing the risk of asthma, cancers, birth defects, and neurological and cardiovascular damage.

TPC GROUP LLC, CN603624289 está solicitando renovación de su Permiso Federal de Operación de la Comisión de Calidad Ambiental de Texas (TCEQ, por sus siglas en inglés) para una planta petroquímica en 8600 Park Place Blvd en Houston, Harris County, Texas 77017 (número de permiso 1598).
